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PRINCIPAL MATTERS

We celebrated some fabulous achievements of our students last week, for those who were able to attend our Presentation Ceremony and end of term Merit Assembly. A huge congratulations to those students that took hold of the many opportunities that led to their achievements throughout the year, and thank you to all staff and parents who continue to help them achieve their best. We are privileged to live in a small community where collaboration and giving back to our students to reach their potential is provided by many businesses and individuals who sponsor the school events and awards. We humbly thank you, and have acknowledged you again further in this newsletter.

The end of year is a very busy time, and it has been marked with staff and student absences due to the newest edition of COVID and influenza. Although we always look on the upside and go above and beyond for our students, it has been a difficult year for staff who work incredibly hard, not only in the classroom but also on other projects that are part of our school's strategic improvement plan. This is the additional work that we do to improve systems and practices across the school for the betterment of our students. We have been challenged by a shortage of casual staff to release teams for planning and the ever-growing list of top-down reform priorities we are expected to implement in short timeframes with limited resources. It is part of my role to report back to the community via the Annual Report about our achievements. Although there is a lot more detail in that document which will be released at the end of Term 1, here is a summary of what the team has been working on across the year. I would like to thank the staff for their ongoing commitment to the school, the students, and our community.

They have made some great progress, a little school, with big dreams for our kids.

Several teams and key staff members have been involved in the development and implementation of activities to support the achievement of our three strategic priorities which are: Student growth and attainment; Quality teaching and learning and Excellence in educational leadership. Here is an overview of what we are working on together.

Learning Culture, Wellbeing and Engagement Priorities

What Works Best - Faculties continued to focus on the implementation of the "What Works Best: Evidence Based Practice" resources, with a key focus on High Expectations for a strengthened focus on learning and students' reaching their full potential. Staff continued to integrate the eight quality teaching practices within their classrooms to enhance the learning outcomes of our students. Head Teachers provided support in coaching and mentoring to further build the capacity and expertise of staff.

Positive Behaviour for Learning - The Data team continued to analyse student incident data in Weeks 5 and 10 to identify individual and whole school Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) needs. Targeted strategies and resources were utilised to support improved `classroom engagement and positive behaviours for learning across the school. The PBL team implemented numerous activities that contributed to our positive school culture and the pro-social behaviour of students. We have seen a continued decline in undesired student behaviour and a reduction in student suspensions. The Department of Education (DoE) has ceased the resourcing of the PBL program, resources have been uploaded to the website for schools to access in the interim.

Student Support Officer (SSO) - The Student Support Officer, Lee-ann McMurtrie, continued to work with the Wellbeing team and the Deputy Principal, Deb Johnston, to mitigate the limited counselling resources available. Collaboration with external agencies and a virtual counselling service ensured wrap around support for our students and families.

Attendance - The continued impact of illness throughout the year contributed to an overall decline in school and network attendance data. Each term student families were contacted to ensure

home school communication and support for students. The SSO role will be vacant in 2023 and planning is underway to develop a structure to best support student need. The recent appointment of a Home School Liaison Officer to the Lithgow School network will allow facilitate networking and more targeted support and discussion of at-risk students during Wellbeing team meetings.

Student Wellbeing - The Wellbeing team has been actively developing and coordinating wellbeing programs throughout the year; improving access to wellbeing and health services within the school. A calendar of activities and programs has been developed aligned to the student wellbeing framework to ensure that all our students wellbeing needs are being met across their cognitive, physical, emotional, social and behavioural areas. Our end of year focus was on surveying our students regarding their thoughts on wellbeing, engagement and learning. The results from the survey will inform personalised learning needs and the development of more targeted learning goals with students in 2023.

Learning Support - Best Start, Check-In, NAPLAN, PAT, Renaissance and Freckle data were analysed to allow a comparison of growth to be demonstrated for our Year 7 cohort. The data was made available to staff at key times throughout the year to support differentiation in the classroom for point-of-need instruction. The Learning and Support team continued to provide intensive support for students in class and within the Intensive Learning Centre to develop literacy and numeracy skills, students also accessed the centre for assistance with assessment tasks or coursework.

Aboriginal Culture and Connections - The Cultural team developed Personalised Learning Pathways with our Indigenous students and families in collaboration with our local knowledge holders. A schedule has been developed to integrate the review of progress data and mentoring for students each term to monitor student achievement and identify additional support.



Curriculum Implementation, Monitoring and Reporting of Achievement Priorities

Curriculum Provision - The Executive team continued to plan for the revision and evaluation of the school's curriculum provision in the areas of student assessment, learning and success criteria, lesson sequencing, differentiation, quality monitoring procedures for Stages 4 and 5, and to provide more opportunities for staff to engage in team teaching and action learning to support student need. Policy and procedures for quality assurance of the years 7-10 curriculum are to be reviewed with staff at the end of year development days to ensure quality teaching practice and alignment to DoE and NESA policy guidelines and requirements.

Student Reporting - The Reporting committee continued to assist with reporting on student achievement and support the timeline in the annual school planning calendar. The committee provides feedback to staff and reviews the report writing style guide to ensure best practice and consistency of report writing across key learning areas. These initiatives have resulted in reporting that is precise, easy to understand and provides information to support further progress and achievement across the curriculum for students.







Quality Professional Practice Priorities

Literacy and Numeracy - The 'Deadly 3' literacy strategy continued in tandem with the 'Three-Tiered Learning' model of student support, specifically targeting improvement in student vocabulary, reading comprehension and fluency based on the identified literacy and numeracy needs of our students. Staff completed professional learning and implemented instructional groupings in the classroom to support improved learning outcomes across the diversity of learners. The team continued to promote a narrow and deep focus on explicit literacy areas. NAPLAN data was analysed to identify and plan whole-school professional learning to support improved numeracy across the key learning areas.

Reading Comprehension and Mathematics - The online Renaissance Star Reading program continued to supplement classroom practice for Years 7, 8 and the 9/10 Curriculum Links to Industry program. The Freckle mathematics program was used with our Year 7 cohort to support skills-based mathematics practice, differentiated to students' point-of-need learning and resulted in positive engagement with the learning activities to improve their numeracy development. kandos-h.school@det.nsw.edu.au | www.kandos-h.schools.nsw.edu.au **Data Collection and Analysis** - The Data team continued the maintenance of student data walls for staff to use to monitor student progress throughout the year and adjust programming and instruction to support personalised learning. A revised parent satisfaction survey was implemented to gain feedback from parents on what we are doing well and areas we need to improve in our home school partnerships and supporting students.

LEED Project - The Leading Evaluation, Evidence and Data professional development provided by the DoE to develop the ability of school leaders to lead evaluation, evidence informed practice and data use has concluded. Key executive and teaching staff have participated in this learning throughout the past two years and completed modules on the use of data to inform practice; Assessment; explicit teaching; effective feedback; collaboration; wellbeing and classroom management.

High Potential - The release of the High Potential and Gifted Education policy and resources prompted staff to participate in professional development for the effective implementation of practice in school. An evaluation of current school procedures, programs and practices has been completed to inform school planning and policy implementation in 2023. We currently are collating student growth and achievement data to assess and identify student need across the key learning areas to identify potential across intellectual, creative, social-emotional and physical domains.

Building Educational Leadership Priorities

Staff Performance and Development - The school's performance and development framework, resources and induction program are still being reviewed to ensure the effective implementation of staff performance and development reviews, enhancing collaborative learning and coaching opportunities.

Policy Review - A review of existing staff policy and procedures had identified a need for clearer role statements across the school and faculties. A draft set of statements has been developed for teaching and non-teaching staff to support the capacity and sustainability of school management and leadership processes, ensuring continuity of student learning and achievement. The draft will be further refined in consultation with staff and published next year.

Operational Improvement for School Success - The School Administration team successfully applied for a grant be part of this project identifying administrative factors contributing to workload for school leaders, teachers, and SASS staff. Opportunities to improve processes are being identified and ways to think differently about the way we work explored to re-distribute administrative tasks from teachers to support staff and provide capability development for non-teaching staff.

School Resourcing, Promotion and Community Engagement Priorities

Rural Access Gap Program - The continuation of the DoE's 'Schools Digital Strategy' has seen the school technology infrastructure undergo a massive change, from interactive screens in every learning space to new laptops for teaching staff. This has assisted with programming and planning for quality teaching. Teachers are now able to use a broader range of software applications. The procurement of three 18 Laptop Pods available for loan has allowed teachers to confidently use technology that is accessible to all. It also reduces the issues around students not being able to access secure DoE internet and portal services. Staff and students have readily embraced the technology that has been made available through this program and it has increased the confidence of technology use across the school.

NAIDOC Week Celebrations - The Cultural team was able to implement some of its key priorities. A 'Wiradjuri" word of the week was introduced to coincide with NAIDOC week which our Indigenous students relay on the Thursday school assembly. Signage in language has been installed in significant locations within the school and QR codes assist with prompting the learning of the correct pronunciation. Students are gaining more knowledge about and pride in culture. We celebrated NAIDOC week by continuing to build upon our local knowledge, cultural practices, dance and language. Students in years 7-10 participated in cultural activities and local knowledge holders worked with identified students. The local community were invited to a special BBQ lunch and the official opening of the Cultural Garden. It is hoped the celebration will increase to include all feeder schools and more of the community in 2023.

Aboriginal Histories and Culture Program - A whole school cultural program over a six week period has been trialed to increase our student's knowledge and understanding of Indigenous culture. The program included activities investigating culture, artefacts, art, language, and celebrations. This culminated in a sharing celebration with students, staff, and community and the development of a shared mural in the Cultural garden. An extension to our Personalised Learning Pathways enables our local community to come into the school each term to mentor students. These initiatives aim to enhance learning programs and activities supporting cultural awareness and an understanding of our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories and culture.





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Community Engagement - The school promotions team reviewed the community engagement resource to identify systems and practices to support further engagement of the community in student learning and school decision making. Engagement continued celebrating our ANZACs, NAIDOC Week, Rylstone Kandos Show, StreetFeast, Remembrance Day, Year 12 Charity Swim Relay, Kandos/ Rylstone Street Machine, school event barbeques and the Artisan Rylstone Markets. The team worked with key community stakeholders to develop further strategies to promote and market our school and community. We introduced an advert to promote the school on community radio and showcased student achievement and promotion of the school with a monthly advert in the Mid-Western Mail.

Community Liaison - The engagement of a Community Liaison Officer to assist with home school partnerships and the promotion of Kandos High School was successfully filled this term. This role will support effective home school communications via parent surveys, the maintenance of the school website to ensure currency and social media management. The position is also instrumental in supporting community engagement initiatives, school promotion and ongoing school publicity via Newsletters, Mid-Western Mail advertising, community posters and inhouse publications.

Quality Learning Environment - End of year funding continued to be allocated to support the upgrade of projects and resources across classrooms and playground. This led to significant procurement to update resources across the school, ensuring quality teaching in the classroom and a quality learning environment for our students.

Not a bad year team! I wish all of our students, parents, carers, staff, and community a relaxing break and will see you back here at Kandos High School for 2023.





Critical Thinking Skills

There are many things you can do to develop your critical thinking skills before you come back to school next year. Critical thinking is your ability to think clearly and rationally, reflecting and developing your thoughts. Sometimes we can get a bit lazy with our thinking and we only consider things at a superficial level. Here are some things you can do to enhance your critical thinking.

1. CLARIFY YOUR THOUGHTS

The best way to clarify your thoughts is to try and explain your thinking to someone else. Even if you are talking to an imaginary person, you will find that explaining your thinking out loud helps you to see the flaws in your argument.

2. QUESTION ASSUMPTIONS

Don't take your thoughts for granted, every now and then think about why you believe a certain thought or how you know things to be true. Get in the habit of pausing and looking at what you are thinking and questioning what thoughts underlie your assumptions. Don't just conform and accept a view because it is the popular one, instead pause and reflect on the arguments for and against that viewpoint and the strengths of each argument.

3. LOOK FOR OTHER PERSPECTIVES

When you are presenting an argument, imagine yourself in a debate and think about what the opposing side might say. What would someone with a completely opposite view to you believe? Can you understand why they might think that way? Can you see some validity in their viewpoint?

4. KEEP AN OPEN MIND

In order to look for other perspectives keep an open mind. If you immediately dismiss any thought that does not fit into the way you see the world, you will never be able to expand and develop your viewpoints, you will have a very fixed and limited view of the world.

5. BE CURIOUS


Start to look outside the things you normally read and watch and think about. Learn more about things you know nothing about and were not previously interested in. Listen more to what people say, we learn so much more when we really listen rather than spend time planning what we will say next.

6. MAKE INFORMED JUDGEMENTS

It is ok to not have an opinion about something because you don't have enough information yet. Avoid rushing to judgements, take your time to gather information and evidence and assess it before making a decision. Try not to let yourself be swayed by emotion as this can affect your ability to assess information intellectually.

Note to schools: information in this document can be copied and shared among your school community

The Australian Federal Police through the <u>Australian Centre to Counter Child Exploitation</u> is seeing a concerning global trend of teenage males being targeted to send explicit images of themselves and then blackmailed. This is called sexual extortion, or sextortion.

The AFP is urging families to have important safety conversations ahead of the school holidays to prevent young people from becoming victim. This crime can have serious wellbeing and psychological impacts.

How does sextortion start?

- Unsolicited friend and follow requests on social media
- Direct messages on one app and then being asked to keep chatting on a secondary app
- Conversations suddenly and quickly becoming sexualised
- Requests for sexualised images or content.

What can families do?

- Have open and regular conversations about your child's online activities and interactions
- Know what platforms, apps and games they are using and who they are interacting with
- Remain open and approachable, victims will be reluctant to come forward if they feel they will be punished or blamed
- Ensure your child knows that it is okay to leave conversations if they feel uncomfortable or unsafe
- Support your child and know how to respond. The <u>Online blackmail and sexual extortion</u> response kit has been created to recognise sextortion and get help.
