Trans - Tasman Squash Cementa Artist Visit - Josie Cavallaro Our meetings generally focus on students with less than this expected attendance rate and communicating with parents and carers to identify ways in which to improve attendance at school. This includes a range of strategies from a simple phone call home to explain a pattern of absence, through to coordinating a meeting to investigate strategies and resources to assist students with special needs in regard to engaging with school.

Students who are of concern regarding attendance where our internal supports have not been successful are referred for extra assistance to the Home School Liaison officer, where we work in partnerships with families. We know that all good habits start at home so here is a recap on some of our expectations, the importance of good attendance and getting our children to arrive at school on time, along with some interesting visuals on how absences add up. For instance, missing as little as one day per fortnight will add up over a student's K-12 education to nearly a year and a half of missed learning opportunities. When our children are not at school they miss important learning content, which becomes harder to catch up with if it becomes a pattern.

Days missed = years lost

A day here and there doesn't seem like much, but...



Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day.
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine.
- Gives students time to greet their friends before class.
- Reduces classroom disruption at the beginning of the lesson, when teachers are usually explaining key concepts and lesson outcomes to the class.
- Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained.
- Lateness also contributes to the overall absence rate for a student.

When a student is absent

When a student is absent from school (including lateness), the absence must be explained by the parent/carer.

Absences are recorded as the following:

Explained/Unexplained - Absences are 'explained' if parents provide the reason for the absence. This does not automatically mean the absence will be deemed 'justified'. Absences for which the school does not receive details will be marked as 'unexplained'.

Justified/Unjustified - For an absence to be accepted as justified, schools must be certain that the leave was warranted. Frequent absences, including lateness to school, may require further action.



Where absences are frequent, schools may:

- Request medical certificates or other evidence. This may require the medical practitioner to state that 'the child is unfit for school' on the specified dates, and/or provide further details of the medical condition and an appropriate health care action plan.
- Refer the absence to the Home School Liaison Officer for intervention.
- In extreme cases, referral of the matter to Family and Community Services as Educational Neglect.

Good pattern of attendance are extremely important. On occasion, students can become school refusers. This term refers to when a child refuses to attend school or has problems remaining in class for an entire day - and is anxiety-based. It can present as extended absences from school, periodic absences from school, missed classes, or chronic lateness with the child experiencing anxiety about school that precipitates pleas for future non-attendance. Parents/carers are usually aware of school refusal absences as there is no attempt by the child to conceal these absences.





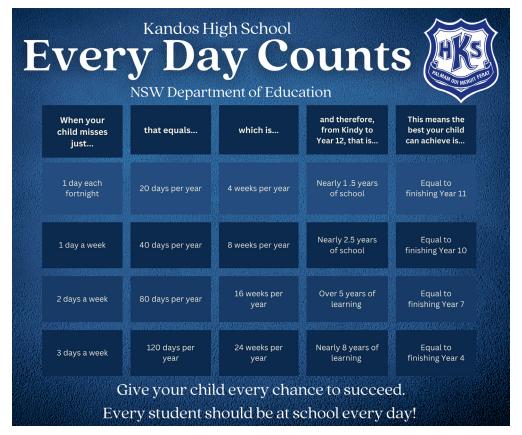


If your child has missed school 2-3 times over a two week period, especially if this absence is related to some of the behaviours below, your child may be at risk of developing a pattern of school refusal. As a parent, some common traits to be aware of include:

- Frequent unexplained/unjustified absences (especially on Mondays, after holidays, school camps or sports days).
- Frequent lateness or partial attendance.
- Absences on significant days (e.g. days on which tests, speeches, or particular classes are scheduled).
- Frequent requests to go to the sick bay, to call home, or to go home during the day. These absences will usually be noted by staff and brought to your attention.
- Tearfulness before school or repeated pleas to stay at home resulting in frequent lateness or absences.
- Frequent complaints of illness before or during school such as stomach aches, headaches, dizziness or fatigue.

Regardless of the reason, non-attendance at school has serious long-term consequences for the child's development, particularly in the areas of intellectual, social and emotional development. There is no off-the-shelf solution for families' experiencing school refusal as each case presents its own set of circumstances.

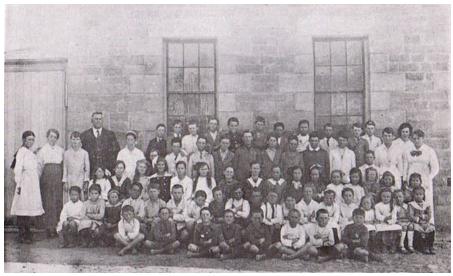
However, there are school staff trained in managing these complex issues who are often able to add further clarity to a child's particular circumstances. Please act promptly if you are having difficulty with getting your child to attend school, to enable early intervention. You can seek urgent assistance by contacting the relevant Deputy Principal or Year Adviser so that appropriate supportive strategies can be put into place.



Education Week - 175 Years of Public Education in NSW

The Coomber Provisional School was the first school in Kandos to be built. A rubblestone building that consisted of 1 classroom, 4 teachers residence rooms and a veranda. The school did not have a bathroom. running hot water or a stove; however, this was quite common during this time. The school later moved to the current Kandos Public School as enrolments grew.

The Coomber Provisional School building is still standing strong and located behind the Kandos Police Station.





In the 1920's, Kandos Public School was an education facility for all ages. The Great Depression had commenced; however, the Kandos district was booming and enrolments at the school was growing rapidly towards 400 students. As a result, the classrooms were overflowing and there wasn't enough resources for the school to thrive.In 1929, after tirelessly campaigning for new classrooms, the Principal, Mr. Meany, the P&C, and the Cement Works had managed to secure two new weatherboard classrooms from Mudgee, as well as a beautiful two-story building that featured four classrooms, an assembly area, staff offices and lavatories. After the buildings were erected, the school celebrated with an open day, inviting the local Catholic School and the Minister of Education to officially open the building.

The two-story building now resides on the Kandos High School grounds and is the oldest building remaining today.

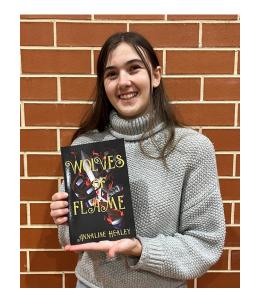


Book Donation by Author Annalise Healey

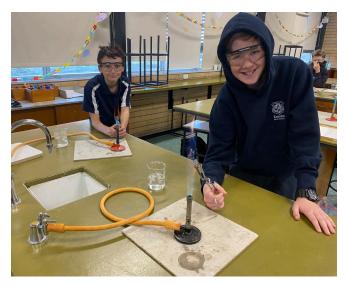
Year 12 TVET Collaboration Project

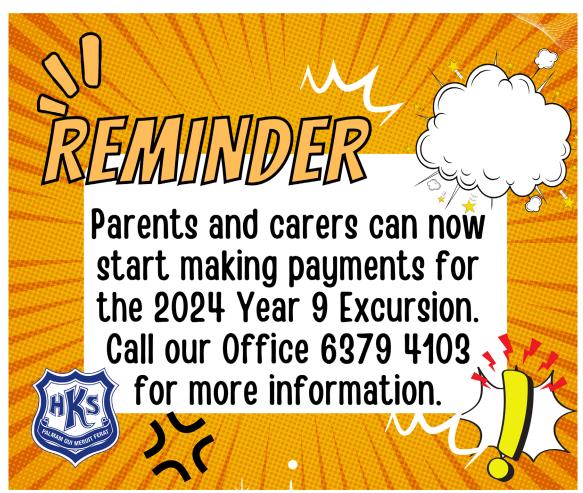












AG BRAG

NAPLAN 2023 results: Information for parents and carers



What's changing?

From 2023, proficiency standards replace the previous reporting of student NAPLAN results that used numerical bands and the national minimum standard.

What are proficiency standards?

Proficiency standards describe what students are expected to know and should be able to do in literacy and numeracy at the time of NAPLAN.

There is a proficiency standard for each test area within each year level.

Students' results are measured against 4 levels of proficiency:

- Exceeding: The student's result exceeded expectations at the time of testing.
- Strong: The student's result met challenging but reasonable expectations at the time of testing.
- Developing: The student's result indicated that they are working towards expectations at the time of testing.
- Needs additional support: The student's result indicated that they did not achieve the learning outcomes expected at the time of testing. They are likely to need additional support to progress satisfactorily.



Has there been a change in what NAPLAN assesses?

No, there has not been a change in what NAPLAN assesses. NAPLAN continues to measure student achievement in numeracy, reading, writing, spelling, grammar and punctuation.

Detailed information on the knowledge and skills being measured in each NAPLAN assessment is available at www.nap.edu.au

Your child's teacher can provide more information into how your child's NAPLAN result relates to their other school-based assessments and classroom learning, and any additional support your child might need.

Why has the reporting changed?

Proficiency standards provide clearer information about a student's NAPLAN achievement based on reasonable expectations of what students should be achieving at the time of testing.

The standards will allow you and your child's teachers to easily identify areas of strength, as well as any areas that may need more support.

How do I know if my child is meeting expectations?

A result in the *Exceeding* or *Strong* level means your child has met and/or exceeded expectations for their current stage of schooling.

A result in the *Developing* or *Needs* additional support level means your child has not yet demonstrated they are meeting expectations for their year level at the time of testing.

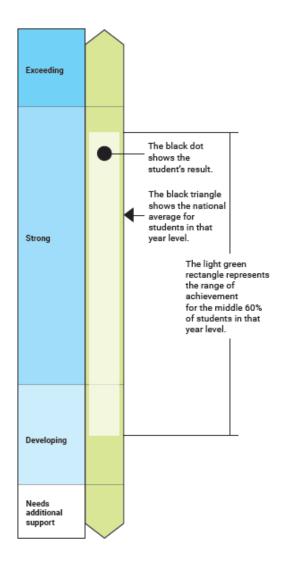
The results are simple to interpret and will allow you to easily identify areas where your child may require additional support.

How will proficiency standards appear on individual student reports (ISRs)?

The report shows 4 levels of proficiency - Exceeding, Strong, Developing and Needs additional support.

A student's result is shown as a black dot on an achievement scale for each assessment area, which shows increasing levels of knowledge, understanding and skills demonstrated in the assessments.

The new report continues to show each student's achievement against the national average (black triangle) and the range of achievement for the middle 60% of students in their year level (light green rectangle).



What skills are expected at each proficiency level?

Proficiency levels are set at a challenging but reasonable level expected for your child at the time of NAPLAN testing, based on what has been taught in previous years of schooling.

Page 4 of the ISR includes a summary of the skills expected at each level of proficiency.

Can I check my child's progress against previous NAPLAN reports?

Results from 2023 cannot be directly compared with results from 2008 to 2022 as:

- all schools now complete NAPLAN online
- the tests are held earlier in the year
- a new measurement scale that is more suited to the online tests has been introduced.

Anxiety in Children with LD

"In Australia approximately 16 per cent of children have a learning difficulty, with 3 per cent having a severe, ongoing learning difficulty" (www.psych4schools.com.au)

Therefore in an average classroom of 30 students, 4-5 will have a learning difficulty and 1 will have a severe learning difficulty. The anxiety that students with learning difficulties experience can appear in a number of ways. The most common ones being:

- F Forget they can 'forget' what is asked of them when the anxiety takes over
- E Excuses they will give reasons why they can't do something
- A Avoid they will have many avoidance techniques, such as, looking for something in their pencil case when the teacher comes over
- R React their reactions can be aggressive and defensive as they feel they are backed into a corner
- S Sick they can feel sick in the situation

Sometimes young children will withdraw from the situations, whereas teenagers may become quite angry and blame others rather than admit the turmoil they are experiencing.

WHAT CAN TEACHERS DO?

- √ Be realistic about where they are –they might be the age of an independent learner, but this skill may still be beyond them.
- √ Be aware as students get older they will prefer not to be removed from class for "support". Work out alternatives.
- ✓ Ensure they know what support they can access at school, eg School Counsellor, Year Advisor, etc.
- ✓ Encourage them to always 'have a go' and reward them for the attempt and the persistence, rather than focussing on the result.
- √ Be aware of anxiety creating situations at school, eg. group work, speaking/reading to
 the class. Modify these activities so as not to increase anxiety levels.
- ✓ Provide the opportunity to develop confidence in their strengths in the classroom situation to help improve their social standing.

Students with DLD will struggle across all areas of the curriculum (Ziegenfusz et al., 2022), as language is the default modality for teaching and learning. This presentation will explicitly address the educational needs of students with DLD (1 in 14 students), including literacy, language, numeracy, and social-emotional wellbeing, as well as outline the current research to provide high quality classroom-based support. We will explore how to ensure students with DLD can access and participate in education on the same basis as peers without DLD (Disability Standards for Education, 2005). Examples of practical strategies will be provided, including the need for collaboration between teachers, speech pathologists and families.

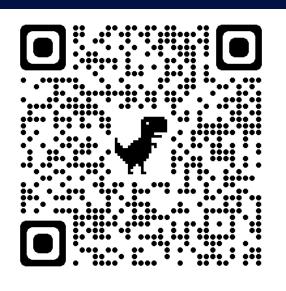

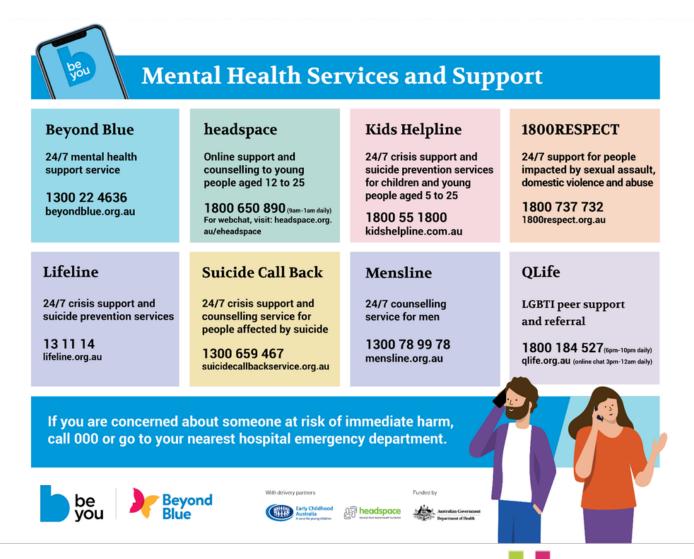
