Deputy's Report

In the last KHS news letter, I explained that from this year students' half-yearly and yearly reports will look different, as we move to integrate more formative assessment.

What's New?

For students in Stage 4 (Years 7 and 8), as well as those enrolled in Stage 5 (Years 9 & 10) elective subjects, Stage 5 English and CLIP subjects, marks and ranks will no longer be included in their reports. Instead, reports will focus on the skills outcomes that students are developing and demonstrating, rather than simply providing a percentage mark based on assessment tasks.

For all other Stage 5 subjects and Year 11 subjects, students in these areas continue to receive traditional metrics of marks and ranks for now.

Benefits of the New Reporting System

- Focus on Skill Development: This new approach emphasises the skills outcomes that students are working towards. Teachers assess their development through a variety of means, beyond just formal assessment tasks and examinations.
- Reporting on Formative Assessment Opportunities: Reporting will have a stronger focus on teacher observations of students' skills and abilities. This will reflect how students engage in the learning process each day, providing a better picture of their growth and development.
- Balanced Approach to Assessment: Students may still complete some summative (formal) assessments, such as tasks or examinations, ensuring that the reports reflect a balanced approach. As well, this ensures that students will still develop the resilience and academic rigour required to adjust to their study for the HSC in their senior years of high school.

Our Hopes for This Transition

school community Our committed to fostering environment that prioritises well-being student academic engagement. By focusing student on development rather than mere achievement, we believe the learning and assessment processes will become more meaningful for all students.

We encourage parents to read the reports together with their child, as this can foster meaningful discussions about learning and growth. If there are any questions or concerns, or if you wish to speak with individual teachers about the report, please do not hesitate to reach out.

Together, we can create a culture where students feel valued for their individual efforts and are motivated to take ownership of their learning.

Thank you for your support as we transition to this new approach to assessment and reporting.




























Ancient Roman Villa Built at KHS

Class S78M have been studying Ancient Rome in History this term and, as part of their learning, they investigated buildings such as the Colosseum and Roman villas.

The class collaborated to create a model of an Ancient Roman villa, complete with temple, atrium, fountains, slave quarters, and a shopping area. The students learnt about Roman building techniques, including early tiled roofs, arches, and mosaic tiles, and discovered that Ancient Roman villas and modern buildings share some similarities in their use of materials and overall design.

Dakota Allans designed the roof decoration of the temple, whilst BJ Amey-Krause, Chayse Edwards, and Gus Scheibner worked with Mr Andrews to build the scaled model. BJ said he "liked creating the model villa from scratch", whilst Chayse said "he liked making the model because it was something new and we got to build the whole villa".

We think the finished model is absolutely fantastic and a credit to the teamwork, creativity, and effort of the whole class. Well done to everyone involved, you've done a brilliant job!















National Sorry Day and Reconciliation Week 2025

On Thursday, 29 May, our school paused to reflect and engage meaningfully with National Sorry Day (26 May) and Reconciliation Week (27 May – 3 June), two significant events in our nation's journey toward healing and unity.

To honour these important occasions, our Indigenous students, alongside Mrs Julie Parsons, led a thoughtful and moving Reconciliation Assembly. The assembly provided an opportunity for our school community to reflect on the meaning of Sorry Day, hear personal insights, and better understand the ongoing significance of reconciliation in Australia.

National Sorry Day acknowledges the Stolen Generations, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children who were forcibly removed from their families under past government policies. It is a day for truth-telling, remembrance, and healing.

Reconciliation Week commemorates two key milestones in our shared history:

- 27 May 1967: The historic referendum in which over 90% of Australians voted to allow the Commonwealth to make laws for Aboriginal people and include them in the national census.
- 3 June 1992: The Mabo Decision, which legally recognised Native Title and overturned the doctrine of terra nullius.











As part of our commemorations, students created purple native hibiscus flowers, a symbol of the Stolen Generations, and wrote personal messages of reflection and hope for the future. It was a powerful gesture that encouraged empathy, awareness, and dialogue across our school.

We were also honoured to host the NSW Aboriginal Education Consultative Group Inc. (AECG) in our Library last Thursday. Their visit was a valuable opportunity to engage with key voices in Aboriginal education and further our commitment to cultural respect and inclusion.

A special thank you to Mrs Julie Parsons and her dedicated students for leading the assembly and preparing a beautiful morning tea for our guests through the Hospitality Team. Your efforts reflected the spirit of care, culture, and community that lies at the heart of reconciliation.

Thank you to all staff and students who participated, supported, and took time to reflect during this important week. Together, we walk the path of truth, respect, and unity.

Parents and carers, we encourage you to ask your child what they have learned from the Study Skills Program so far. What strategies are they finding useful? How can they apply them at home or in class? These conversations can make a real difference in building confidence and reinforcing strong learning habits.


